Recently I caught up with Caroline, who runs the Pleasure Riding Scheme and her trusty steed Jigsaw (by email in line with social distancing policy!). We had persuaded her to give a talk to us all one Tuesday evening about her visit to the Lipizzaner stud and see the White Horses perform. So, without further ado here's what she had to tell us.

'The Lipizzaner Horse.'

"I have been asked what attracted me to the white horses in the first place.

It was when I was a child. I watched the children's programme the white horses (as I imagine many of us did!) and fell in love with the dark kind eyes of the wonderful graceful horses that captivated me by their grace and power.

A brief history of the Lipizzaner is not easy to do. They have had a very long and at times scary history. Because of the turbulent history of Europe, the Lipizzaner has had to flee for their lives many times from 1797 due to Napoli an up until 1949 due to the second world war.

The first official stud farm for the Lipizzaner is the one in Lippitza Salvinia, (this is the stud that I visited last year) which was founded in the 1600's. As I have mentioned the horses fled to various locations, so by the end of 1947 there were only 23 breeding mares left! *So, the battle to keep the original Lipizzaner breed was underway.*



All pure Lipizzaner horses originate from six stallions. They are Pluto1765, Conversano1767, Neopolitano 1790, Malestoso 1773, Favory 1779 and Siglavy 1810.

The Lipizzaner is known for its noble head, dark eyes, medium height strong legs and feet and of course flowing exaggerated action.

All Lipizzaner horses are born dark in colour. They slowly become lighter and should have their beautiful white coats between 4 and 10 years. There are some Ovations horses that will keep their dark coats.

My visit to Lippitza stud was a dream come true. I had in my memory the wonderful pictures of loads of beautiful white mares and foals running together in the fields at Lippitza in the white horse's programme.

To see it for real was wonderful I must admit I had a few tears!

We were given a tour of the farm and were allowed to touch the horses and just wonder around them. They were so kind and seemed to very much enjoy the attention.

We had the privilege to see a stallion being lunged. My goodness he knew he was beautiful. His feet didn't seem to touch the ground! A show is put on each day in the indoor school of the horses showing off their various skills. We saw them being ridden to the high standard that we see at the Spanish riding school including the movements off the ground, the Capriole, the Levade and the Courbette amazing!! The Lipizzaner is also known as a driving or carriage horse. I am sure they are not supposed to go the speeds we saw them do! It was a wonderful show of skill from the driver and power of the horses.

The show was finished as it started where mares were allowed to enter the school and just roam around as they wanted. Some rolled, others just laid down and it was a very calm and beautiful experience.

I have also been asked if the white horses have influenced my passion for dressage to music.

I have always been fascinated by dressage. When I was a lot younger!! and first started to ride, I never thought I would ever be good enough to manage this skill. But as the years have gone by, I have a good go at it. Maybe in the back of my mind I see the beautiful white horses that have inspired me to have a go.

My two greatest joys in life are music and horses so putting them together seems the right thing to do so when Jig and I are dancing together maybe in my mind Jig is a white horse gliding as I see the white horses do."
